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'Thief Powder'

In cases involving thefts from lockers, dorms, offices, etc., it is usually too expensive and too time-consuming to lie in wait for the thief. It is much more practical to use 'thief powder'. There are a number of such chemicals available to suit specific purposes. The one that the Bureau resorts

to most frequently is the fluorescing variety.

A recent example comes to mind. The chef's liquor supply at a country club had been continually broken into, and the thefts were beginning to disturb management. It was certainly not a revenue draining situation, but it disrupted the normal routine.

So a Doyle operator 'dusted' the liquor bottles and returned them to the storage bin. When the next theft occurred, the suspect was questioned and his hands, when exposed to a special ultraviolet light, showed traces of the powder. He subsequently confessed to the thefts.

An interesting aspect of this case was that the culprit turned out to be the dishwasher. His hands had been immersed in detergent for six hours af-

ter the theft, but the fluorescent powder still showed up in traces on his person and clothing.

These 'thief powders' are powerful detection devices. They are usually dusted on particular objects, wallets, door nobs. The ultraviolet lamp is portable and can be used at the scene of the theft.

It has to be used with discretion, though, because there are certain lipsticks and some nail polishes that contain dyes which fluoresce red, orange, or yellow. That is why it should only be used by professionals, who are versed in substantiating identifications.

The care and feeding of merchandise in an area of storage - manufacturing plant, warehouse, or stockroom, is a matter that should be handled by professionals. There have been instances where unchecked pilferage and shrinkage have forced companies into bankruptcy. More often, the situation drains profit.

That is why it is so hard to understand the logic that prompts so many firms, large and small, to concentrate with intense fury upon production and marketing and promotion, but give only honorable mention to security.

Not so, however, with a Doyle account. Since the Bureau's only business is security, the odds are heavily in favor of its professional approach in the battle to protect employer property, merchandise, and profit.

Doyle 'tailored security' might seem like an intangible, until company management observes how it works in actual practice. The objective is to curb profit drains by tightening security, and then to activate a deterrent syndrome which prevents future malfeasance. The Bureau has yet to find an internally directed security system that cannot be improved upon.

The thing to remember is that there are no general packages which can be adopted in whole for a specific company. It is always necessary for Doyle to go through the painstaking steps of a security audit to determine the actual requirements of a prospective account before coming up with specific recommendations that can be implemented as economically as possible.

The warehouse or storage area is one of the most vulnerable spots in any operation. A security audit starts with a careful appraisal of that area. The operational layout is examined and suggestions are advanced on how to obtain a maximum number of observation aisles and just what can be done to foster a cleaner line of sight. Control and accountability procedures are reconstructed for greater effectiveness. Inventory and checking figure in the audit. Identification of employees, equipment and tools; segregation of attractive merchandise; sales to employees; separation of shipping and receiving; waste and scrap control - all must be examined regardless of the size of the company.

There must also be deliberation on external factors, like perimeter protection with fences, lighting, alarms. There must be personnel programs which offer a means of background investigation. There must certainly be maximum fire and safety prevention effort.

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From The Files: Detection Of Warehouse Thefts

If there had not been an undercover operator assigned to track down the suspected irregularity, the chances are that it would have continued for many more months.

A dishonest employee had devised an ingenious method of confiscating merchandise for resale. The company manufactured consumer hard goods, and the warehouse where this employee worked was a massive one. His job was to deliver merchandise to specified sections of the warehouse after the goods came off the assembly line. The merchandise was crated and stacked. This employee also took the orders to be shipped and obtained the crates and brought them to the delivery dock.

Management believed it had an excellent control system. Periodic inventories showed no excessive shortages, yet word got out that a steady stream of goods was being black marketed in the area.

An undercover operator applied for a warehouse job through regular personnel channels. He was hired and assigned to the area where management suspected the source of the trouble lay. This undercover man received the regular rate of pay and performed the regular duties of his job - so well that he even got a raise in very short order.

In addition to his regular duties, he acted as the eyes and ears of the security agency which had been retained. He was personable and he quickly gained the confidence of every other employee.

It took him just two weeks to uncover the source of the shrinkage. It seems that the dishonest employee had noticed that those who took inventory just tilted each crate in order to check if it was full. If the crate did not tilt, the inventory control sheets were marked to indicate a full crate. So all that the employee had to do after removing half a crate of merchandise each time, was nail the crate to the floor and replace the remaining half of the contents.

Very clever, because the half-filled crates were shunted to the rear, where they would remain in limbo for a very long time.

How else would the thefts have been uncovered as quickly as that? Often, an undercover operator is the most effective method of solving a serious problem.
